FOREST LODGE DRILL HALL

(report by Alex Bell)

On the 16th July '98 at the request of the "Save the DrillHall Campaign Committee" I forwarded a lengthy submission to TheHon Ian McLachlan, A.O., M.P., Minister for Defence to retain the present Forest Lodge Drill Hall as a facility for community purposes, i.e., indoor sports, (cricket etc.), community meetings and suchlike as an alternative to the existing plan to sell to a private developer when the present service group is moved to a depot at Dundas. The main thrust of my submission being the many known instances of Association member identification with both WWI and WWII with this location.

A REPLY dated 28th August with the full explanation given that the proceeds of a sale of Forest Lodge was necessary to offset the capital cost to establish the new Dundas facility was received. The final paragraph of the Minister's letter is quoted in full:

"Accordingly, your request to retain the hall for community use cannot be agreed. However, you will be pleased to hear that in recognition of the significance the site has to the community and members of your Association, Defence will be requiring of any future owner that a small monument be erected on the property which commemorates the efforts of the 55 & 53 Infantry Battalions."

This commemorative plaque recognition, our church St John's, Glebe, with our memorabilia insafe custody at the Glebe Library added to solid local community support assures the ongoing "Service" identity of 55/53 in the Glebe/Leichhardt area of Sydney.

KOKODA COMMITTEE NSW INC.

The annual commemorative service will be held at Martin Place Cenotaph at 11am on Wednesday, 4th November, in the presence of the Governor of N.S.W., His Excellency the Hon. Gordon Samuells A.C. . All able to attend will be most welcome and a single rose will be provided for all present in lieu of wreath laying.

KOKODA MEMORIAL WALKWAY - CONCORD

With very short notice, at 1030 am Friday, 11th September '98, the premier of **N.** S.W., the Hon Bob Carr, M.P., officially unveiled and dedicated the Memorial Flagpole and Plaque to all Medical, Nursing and Support Staff of the Concord Hospital- past and present.

A reasonable number of members together with the committee were mustered to represent the Association's interest and support to this event. It was a most impressive service and the Army Re- enactment Group led by "Skeeter" Matthew received a warm acknowledgment from those in attendance.

A further warning notice has been given that at 2.30pm on Sunday 1st November, the Rose Garden itself will be dedicated.

Association members available are invited to attend to see our plaque located at this site. The usual dress requirements are jacket, ties and medals.

Stepping up action for the incomplete phase of the Walkway project, efforts are being

made at the Bray's Bay area (waterfront) to be completed. This area includes our commemorative "Sanananda" Station and it may occur in December this year. If so, a special sheet advice will accompany this issue of "Orderly Room Gossip" to obtain a representative gathering for this specialoccasion.

On a personal note, I attended the celebration day (20th September) at the Army Museum, Victoria Barracks, Paddington. Theoccasion marked the completion of the Museum restoration (in excess of one million dollars) and enabled those present to hear of the future plans for this magnificent centre.

MEMORIAL PARKS IN FRANCE FROMELLES & LE HAMEL

The battle of FROMELLES (July 1916) resulted in 5533 Australian casualties. The battle of LE HAMEL (July 1918) planned and conducted by an Australian commander, General John MONASH was acknowledged a masterpiece of planning and execution.

Both battlefields were focal points for the commemorative memorial dedication in July 1988. Our Frenchman "MATE", YVES FOHLEN represented us on these occasions and placed a simple white rose at the memorial ceremony. During this time Yves also submitted an article (in French) for the local press under the title: -

TALES OF THE GREAT WAR

During the four years of the First World War more than 400,000 Australians volunteered to engage in this conflict (more than 10% of the Australian population at that time). More than 60,000 among them never returned. 45,000 of them died in Europe. These terrible figures can be explained by the fact that the Australian Infantry Units were most often used

as shock troops. This is how they were used, for example, at Fromelles near d'Armentieres in July 1916, (5,500 killed or wounded in 2 days), at Posieres (23,00 killed or wounded in 2 months), Bellicourt in April and May 1918 (10,000 killed or wounded), at Villiers-Bretonneux on 24 & 25 of April 1918 to retake the village and thus put a definite stop to the German offensive only 16k from Amiens.

Then on 8 August 1918, alongside the Canadians, the Australian "diggers" were the spearhead of the victorious Allied counter-

attack until the Armistice, liberating Peronne on the way and participating in the breaching of the famous Hindenburg Line in 1'Aisne around Bonney and Bellicourt.

Major General Gordon Maitland, the leader of the official tour party to France met Yves and not only was he impressed with Yves'dedication etc., he was also greatly taken with Yves' very charming and very newbride.

Members may have noted on page 8 of September/October issue of "Reveille" the notice for a book titled "He Came from Australia". This is a publication of Yves' and is about Lieut. Percy Ralph, M.M.,M.I.D., 53rd Bn WWI, a paperback for \$20.00 (including postage and handling). The official launch of the book will beat Villiers Bretonneux, France on 14th October 1998.

BRISBANE FREEDOM WALL MOUNT COO-THA BOTANICAL GARDENS

Replacement of the 15,600 brass plaques now cast and sealed at high temperature to protect them from weathering, similar to those used in memorials throughout Australia was completed in September this year.(55/53's "Lest WeForget" plaque to the 161 K.I.A. is included on the Freedom Wall).

OUR FLAG

An article appeared in the U.K. Mail Newspaper 15 Feb. 1998 with the caption: "IS IT THE LAST WALTZ OF MATILDA"--- part of which reads "By a vote of 89-52 the constitution convention voted a preference for Australia as a Republic. The over 55's preferring to retain the monarchy and the young favouring a republic. When the time arrives "LOOK WELL TO YOUR BALLOT". I also like the quote on the back page of "Gun Blast", (14 Field Regt Newsletter) which features our present flag with the words - <u>THIS IS YOUR FLAG - YOU FOUGHT FOR IT - PROTE</u>CT IT.

<u>36 INF BN</u> - President Keith Irwin was honoured for his services to the Association in the June '98 Honours List with an O.A.M. (Medal of the Order of Australia) and congratulations have been passed on to Keith. (In the same Honours List was Harry FOX of BEROWRA HEIGHTS, an Associate Member who received a similar award for services to the community.) Keith was given permission to publish in "Marching On", Capt O'DELL'S personal research of the 53rd early Kokoda involvement which 55/53 personally subsidised the cost. The 14th Field Regt was given similar permission to use the same copy in "Gun Blast".

As you will remember the Companies and Battalion were sitting along the narrow ridge. I had charge of a "bits and pieces" company composed of all the odds and sods in the intelligence, transport, cooks and other HQ sections.

I had the misfortune (or perhaps on reflection good fortune) of being asked some time back at Torokina to join the CO and others in games of draw poker.

It so happened that draw poker was my favorite game and had been since the age of 10. During my teen years and early in the war I used almost to earn a living from the noble game.

It was little wonder that the CO and others became regular contributors to my income.

Well, we're sitting minding our own business, sometimes getting called on to go on patrols and going through our on and off guard duties, when one day I got a message from the CO to see him for a conference at about 1900 hours that night and that the sentries would be alerted to my arrival. Hell, I thought, what's on. Was it my turn for another patrol?

Anyway, at 1800 hours I crept out into the dark, told our sentry to tell his successor I'd be back (I hoped). I edged my way along the 500 yards of narrow track with my pistol in front like Wyatt Earp. I wouldn't be exaggerating to say I could have pooped myself all the way. Well when I arrived, gave the password and saw the Co, the task I had to perform was to play poker. The school was obviously determined to get their money back.

Getting back to my lodgings at about 0200 hours was just as traumatic. I did it on another occasion as well while on the Ridge. I think I enjoyed it really, particularly the contribution to my paybook.
